

## **RABBI BIGMAN'S LETTER**

For many years it was my custom to share with you books I have read and/or have been added to the temple's library in preparation for Jewish Book Month. I have been remiss the past few years, but wanted to bring back the custom this year.

Jewish Book Month was established by the Jewish Book Council "to promote the reading, writing and publishing of quality English language books of Jewish content in North America." Jewish Book Month occurs annually during the month prior to *Chanukah* (25 *Cheshvan* - 25 *Kislev*). This year that coincides with the secular dates November 12 - December 10.

The books below have all been provided by the generous donors to the Henry Fine and Annette Fine Burke Library Fund. Since the temple building has been closed due to the global health situation, the books listed are currently "residing" in my home. If you are interested in checking out any of them, please let me know and I will make arrangements to get the book(s) to you.

### Children's Books

### The Purim Superhero by Elisabeth Kushner

*The story of a boy who doesn't want to dress like a superhero for* Purim *as do the other boys in his class.* <u>Roller-Coaster Grandma</u> by Dr. Ruth Westheimer and Pierre Lehu

A graphic novel of the life of Dr. Ruth Westheimer, from being a Holocaust survivor to an Israeli soldier to a therapist and radio personality.

<u>Martin & Anne: The Kindred Spirits of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Anne Frank</u> by Nancy Churnin The stories and lessons of the lives of two people, born in the same year, who lived across the ocean from each other.

### A Moon for Moe and Mo by Jane Breskin Zalben

The story of Moses Feldman (Moe) and Mohammed Hassan (Mo) who live at opposite ends of Flatbush Avenue in Brooklyn. They meet while their mothers are shopping for Rosh HaShanah and Ramadan, respectively.

### The Adventures of Hershel of Ostropol by Eric A. Kimmel

An anthology of stories about Hershel and how his cleverness helps him through life.

The Flower Girl Wore Celery by Meryl G. Gordon

Emma is invited to be the flower girl at her aunt's wedding: Is she really going to wear a dress made of celery? Is she really going to walk down the aisle next to the "ring bear"? Isn't the "bear" scary?

### Adopting Ahava by Jennifer Byrne

Jonathan is an adopted child; for his birthday present, his mothers take him to the local animal shelter to adopt a pet.

It's Too Crowded in Here! and Other Jewish Folktales by Behrman House Publishing

*Eight folktales, based upon* Torah *and* Talmud *stories, are re-told for young children in this book. Each tale is followed by a page of resources for parents to discuss the Jewish value taught in each folktale.* 

### Young Adult Book

Color Me In by Natasha Diaz

Inspired by the author's life, the main character, Nevaeh, feels invisible in both the Black and Jewish communities of which she is a part given her parentage.

Ariel Samson: Freelance Rabbi by MaNishtana

A semi-autobiographical novel about Ariel Samson: a twenty-something black Orthodox rabbi

On November 8, we will be joining our friends from Khunim (KI's religious school) and students around the world to study the concept of Human Dignity (kavod habriyot) as part of the Global Day of Jewish Learning put on annually by Limmud.

On this special day, students of all ages across the globe study the same topic for one day of intense Jewish learning. Our adult friends will be meeting from 10:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and then the religious schools will meet from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. all via Zoom.

Links will be provided to SZRS families and adults who register.

Students in gan (pre-K/K) through second grade will be looking at ways we can think about treating all humans with dignity.

Students in third through seventh grade will be doing some problem based learning, considering when respecting human dignity might come before other important Jewish obligations. High-schoolers will have their regular classes but beginning at 12:15 p.m.

### DOES THE JEWISH STATE TREAT ALL JEWS EQUALLY?

AN EXCLUSIVE CONVERSATION WITH ANAT HOFFMAN, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE ISRAEL RELIGIOUS ACTION CENTER

### SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 15 1:00 p.m. via Zoom

Anat Hoffman will meet with Shaarey Zedek and community members to discuss the treatment of Reform and other liberal Jewish movements in Israel. For many years, Reform Jews in Israel have suffered discrimination and even violence, and IRAC has endured many legal struggles on the way. IRAC's persistence is beginning to pay off, as things are beginning to develop in a positive and more cordial direction. Nonetheless, the status quo still prevails in Israeli society today.

This webinar will reflect on the current legal status of the Reform and other liberal Jewish movements in Israel. We will address the challenges of having non-Orthodox conversions and weddings recognized; equal governmental funding; and the challenges facing our congregations.



Anat Hoffman has served as the Executive Director of IRAC since April 2002. She previously served as a member of the Jerusalem City Council for 14 years, and she is one of the only women in Israel who served three terms on a city council. During those years, Anat built a reputation for being an effective and courageous fighter for social justice and equality as part of the opposition. Anat chose to devote her adult life to the Jewish value of Tikkun Olam, repairing the world. Beginning in 1988, she served as Chairwoman of Women of the Wall, who fight for the rights of women to pray, read Torah, and wear tallitot at the Western Wall.

Anat Hoffman, as a girl, was an Israeli swimming champion, and since has preserved a strong connection with the world of sports, specifically the topic of women in sports. Anat has a B.A. in psychology from UCLA. She lives in Jerusalem and is the mother of three.
