MAKING AN APPOINTMENT

We find the word "mo'eid" throughout the *Tanakh*. There is also a *Talmud*ic tractate called *Mo'eid*. The word is often translated as "fixed time" as in the opening verses of Leviticus 23: "The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: 'Speak to the Israelite people and say to them: These are My fixed times, the fixed times of the Lord, which you shall proclaim as sacred occasions.'" The word which is translated into English as "fixed time," *mo'eid*, can also be translated as "appointment." We could now translate the text as follows: "'... These are My appointments, the appointments of the Lord, which you shall proclaim as sacred occasions.""

This sounds more like God is inviting us in rather than commanding us to do something. Rather than looking at the holy days and festivals as times where duty compels us to come to the synagogue and/or to partake of certain traditions in our homes, we should look at them as invitations. God is inviting us to return to God, to our people, and to our traditions, even if we may have absented ourselves from them previously. We may not have stepped foot in a synagogue or participated in Jewish rituals at home recently, yet God is inviting us to come back.

Our *Torah* tells us of the *Ohel Mo'eid* ("Tent of Meeting") which our ancestors built to bring the community together. <u>The Jewish Encyclopedia</u> translates *Ohel Mo'eid* as the "tent of mutual appointment,' that is, [the] place of meeting." Similarly, modern synagogues are referred to as *Batei K'nesset* (Houses of Gathering or Meeting).

Synagogues are where people gather or meet. Yet too often people have complained to me that they were not welcome in a congregation because they were not wealthy. People have told me that they would have liked to become Jewish, but were told that they had to be born Jewish and could not convert to Judaism. I would not want to be part of a congregation or a religion that didn't welcome people. Indeed, we are told in the *Torah* numerous times to welcome the stranger, to welcome those who feel or perceive themselves as unwelcome.

Perhaps that is why I prefer the translation of *mo'eid* as an appointment: We make appointments all the time – with our doctors, with our clients, with our rabbis*. All we have to do is pick up the telephone, go online, or send an e-mail in order to make an appointment. So, too, with God: all we have to do is make the appointment. Set aside time on *Shabbat* for an appointment with God. Come worship with your Jewish family. Study the weekly *parashah* with a friend or via our new online sessions. Judaism is easily accessible. Just take the time to set up an appointment.



(HAPPY BIRTHDAY)







In his now classic book, <u>Bowling Alone</u>, Robert Putnam bemoans the decrease in civic engagement in the US, using declining interest in bowling leagues as his emblematic example. This influential work, published in 2000, turned out to be the proverbial canary in the coal mine as the rise of digital media over the last two decades, coupled with impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic, have had a profound effect on face-to-face communication in general, and membership in nonprofit organizations specifically.

Indeed, houses of worship have been feeling the loss of membership and decline in member engagement deeply. In his 2023 article, "This is Not the End of the Synagogue" in the Jewish Journal, Matthew Schultz notes that "according to a 2020 Pew Research Center study, more than a third of Conservative synagogues and a fifth of Reform synagogues have 'gone out of business' in the past two decades," and that "only 20% of American Jews show their faces in a synagogue at least once a month." Discussing the fact that many Jews are not observant and might only attend synagogue on the High Holy Days, however, Schultz urges us to realize that regular synagogue attendance has never been particularly high. He offers possible alternatives to traditional worship in traditional synagogues, asking us to consider the needs and resources of our congregational communities as we contemplate a future of flexibility and adaptation.

Writing in "The Wall Street Journal" on October 17, 2024, Gregory Zuckerman is even more optimistic, heartened by the increase in affiliation with Jewish organizations since the devastating Hamas attack on Israel on October 7, 2023. Zuckerman reports that "Some 43% of American Jews say they are more engaged in Jewish life than before the Oct. 7 attacks, including roughly a third of the community who said they previously had minimal involvement" (according to 2024 data from a Jewish Federations of North America survey of 6,000 people). Both Schultz and Zuckerman provide counterarguments to the collective handwringing common within congregations as members worry that a decrease in synagogue membership portends a bleak future for the Jewish community.

These perspectives are relevant to the concerns I hear from some of you. They are also relevant to a challenge our synagogue leadership faces on a daily basis: trying to increase member engagement. Whether through serving on committees, working on projects, or even simply attending events, members are the lifeblood of our congregation. We need YOU to get involved! Even an hour a week helps immensely, and there are countless opportunities to volunteer your time. Are you passionate about welcoming new members? Join the Membership Committee! Are you interested in helping others who are ill or grieving? Join the Caring Community! Are you willing to assist in setting up for or cleaning up after an event or to serve as a greeter for *Shabbat* services? Call the main office and your offer will be welcome! Please engage in any way that works for you; we need your energy and commitment to meet our congregational needs!
